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GENERALS PREPARE FOR SEASON'S HARDEST GAME

They lost their first important game of the season to Pittsburg, but from what critics say who saw the game, they presented the game to the Pitt Panthers on a platter by making numerous fumbles that were converted into scores.

Pittsburg defeated Geneva last Saturday by only a 13 to 0 score and the Mountaineers had little trouble in making them take the small end of a 61 to 0 count, thus showing that West Virginia is much stronger at present than Pitt. Last week-end the Spears machine downed Colgate 34 to 2. The first string regulars only played eight minutes of the fray, Coach Spears saving them for this week's game with the Generals.

There are two players on the Morgantown eleven this year that are well known to the students of Lexington. "Doc" Bruder is an ex-General, he having played on the White and Blue first year eleven in 1922, and the other Mountaineer is "Skeet" Farley, who was on the V. M. I. eleven this year and their playing has been an outstanding feature in West Virginia's victories. It was Farley who defeated Centre in the Polo Grounds by making two touchdowns.

The present West Virginia team is much lighter than those of the past, but is also faster. What the team lacks in weight, it makes up in speed. Coach Spears has a backfield of six men that he uses interchangeably in every game. These are Nardacci, Ekberg, Farley, Murrin, Morrison and Bruder. Morrison and Murrin are sophomores, having graduate from freshman ranks of last year. Murrin scored all of his team's touchdowns in the opening game of the season against West Virginia Wesleyan.

Since the Little Mountaineers have scored a 13 to 0 victory over the Little Generals, the big brothers of the Generals' first year men are hoping to avenge this setback and send the Mountaineers back to Morgantown with the small end of the score.

The Spears eleven is being taught to remember one November eleven back in 1922 when the Generals, who were doped to be defeated by three touchdowns, tied the Morgantown

team in a 12-12 tie. This game marred the West Virginians' record of a perfect season, and they are preparing to prevent a repetition of it this year.
