

Students, faculty discuss university race relations

A group of Washington and Lee students and faculty members participated in a conference Saturday on black-white relations at predominantly white school.

The 13 students — three of whom are white — and four faculty members attended movies and discussions about problems minorities have on campus, interracial teaching effectiveness, and strategies for increasing interracial participation in University activities.

Students and faculty members from other area schools attended the annual conference at the University of Virginia.

Billy Rhinehart, treasurer for the Student Association for Black Unity, said he got a lot out of the conference.

"I got a lot of frustrations out," Rhinehart said. "It helped me just to deal with [the problems]. I know there are a lot of problems... You just have to try to get what you can out of the whole W&L experience and just try to help make the minority agenda a student body issue."

"We found out that we're not alone," he continued. "We're all just trying to achieve equality."

Felton May, a sophomore SABU member who also attended the conference, said, "There's just a need — at all schools, not just at this one — for blacks and whites to get together just to see what everybody's views are."
